

Our advanced exhibits allow us to win fingerprint cases. The Following fingerprint examples were taken from actual cases where both the fingerprint examiner and the verifying fingerprint examiner agreed that the crime scene fingerprints matched the known fingerprints.

NO MATCH, in case #2. The textured surface on jewelry box renders the crime scene fingerprint unsuitable for analysis.

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INCONCLUSIVE, in case #3. There is not enough detail on the exemplar, thus making it easier for a latent to apparently match without exclusion.

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INCONCLUSIVE. If the known fingerprint of the accused was a face, the crime scene fingerprint would only be the nose, in case #1.
